CHURCH LETTER From Diana Nicholson, Reader, St. Patrick's, Bampton

I am writing this letter at the beginning of February and I know that you will not read it until March, nearly four weeks away

I wonder what will have happened between now and then. Will we have had another "Beast from the East" as we did last year when snow and freezing weather came at the beginning of March, so bad that for the first time the World Day of Prayer service at Shap had to be cancelled?

What will have happened to the Brexit negotiations? Will there be any more certainty than there is now about the future relations between the EU and the UK? Will more international companies have decided to move their headquarters or some of their factories out of the UK?

Not even the weathermen can predict exactly what weather will come; there is nobody who can be sure what Brexit will bring and yet it is so easy to spend time being anxious about the future, our personal future as well as the future of our society. Of course we all have concerns but to be anxious about things which may not ever happen or about events over which we have no influence does us no good and stops us from enjoying the present.

Much of Jesus' teaching is about wrong priorities, about rich men spending all their time and energy to amass great fortunes only to die before they could enjoy them, about setting your heart on gaining riches, respect, influence in this world instead of loving God and your neighbour and giving really generously to the needy. The latter part of Matthew chapter 6 is all about trusting God to provide for your needs instead of spending all your time worrying about material things. In the King James Bible the last verse of this chapter reads "Take no thought for the morrow: for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself. Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof." The new translations differently. put it

"Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own."

I don't think that any of us would want to take no thought for tomorrow and what it may or certainly will bring. We pay into our pension schemes, pay our National Insurance so that we can provide for ourselves in later life: we write our wills so that our families can follow our wishes when we die. All these are sensible things to do. But in the more modern translations, which are closer to the original New Testament Greek, the emphasis is on not worrying about the future, rather than on not making sensible preparations for it.

Stress and worry are some of the major health problems of our day and age. Even in our primary schools children feel the pressure to succeed and feel stressed and worried. What is being introduced into many schools is the practice of "mindfulness", which encourages children to have times of stillness and calm when they can learn to be aware of their bodies, of the things around them, can learn to concentrate on the present and to acknowledge the thoughts and feelings they have without allowing these to overwhelm them. It's a practice which is helpful for everyone, but Christians can go beyond this by being conscious that they are being still in the presence of God.

The advocates of mindfulness stress the importance of practising it every day just as Christian teachers all emphasise the need for regular times of prayer if we are to grow in our faith. If our prayer starts by our being still, by acknowledging that God is with us, even if we do not feel this, by being mindful of our bodies and our surroundings, of the present, then perhaps we shall find it easier to be regular in prayer and to listen to God as well as to speak to God.

Shall we all, Christians and non-Christians alike, give mindfulness a go?




"A new command I give you. Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." (John 13: 34-35)

Everything is ready and the invitation is for everyone - men, women and children of all ages to join this Day of Prayer.* Women of Slovenia, one of the smallest and youngest countries in Europe, have prepared this years' service and they encourage us to reflect on the barriers they have faced since the end of the Second World War when their country was a part of Yugoslavia, a Marxist socialist republic. They share the challenges they have met and the hopes they have for the future.

World Day of Prayer is an international, interchurch organisation which enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. The preparation for the day is vast. An international committee is based in New York and there are national committees in each participating country. Regional conferences meet to consider the service and then local groups make their plans.

In our area, at **Tebay Methodist Church at 2pm on Friday 1st March 2019** people will gather to celebrate the service prepared by the women of Slovenia.

The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 120 countries. It begins in Samoa and prayer in native languages travels throughout the world --- through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Samoa some 38 hours later.

It is becoming difficult to maintain this tradition as fewer people are prepared to add their names to the Flower Rota.


Fancy flower arrangements are not expected or needed. Simple bunches of flowers or just greenery is saying you care. You may be remembering loved ones, or a special occasion.

The Flower Rota is displayed at the back of the church, next to the door. Please consider adding your name. If you would like more information telephone Angela Milburn. 015396 24382.






Orton Churchyard Project

We hope, by the time you read this, that our interpretation board concerning the project in All Saints' Churchyard, which began in September 2016, will have been erected in the church porch! It has been good to see the fruition of the work taken on by no less than 45 volunteers.

Some of these volunteers have given their professional skills such as art work, construction, and the bat survey, but also there has been a small army of local people who have willingly given their time and labour just steadily working away in the churchyard. Clearing debris – the result of tree felling, sawing logs, taking away bags and bags of wood chippings, sweeping leaves, and planting and caring for the new trees; supervising children at Orton School making bird boxes and later erecting them on the trees, and helping Tiny Hillbillies and Class 1 from school to plant bulbs; re-furbishing the benches which I know are used - especially in Summer- by those visiting the area.

Many, many hours were spent photographing all the headstones in both parts of the churchyard, and together with a transcript of the inscriptions these are now printed into a book which is kept in Church for anyone to look at or use in conjunction with family history research.

Several headstones that have become unstable have also been reset by volunteers as well as some broken ones being mended. Other headstone repairs have been carried out by professional memorial masons as being beyond the capabilities of our team. It is actually the responsibility of the descendants to repair headstones and two families kindly paid for this work to be done on their ancestors' stones.

Donations of wood for bird boxes, the hedgehog house and a squirrel feeder were also made. One of our village families is caring for the bird feeding station which was made locally and donated too. Sedbergh Young Rangers came to re-instate the footpath pointing towards Shap from the wooden stile to the stone style in the wall.

We have created a small stumpery garden in the east corner of the churchyard in order to make use of the large stumps that we were unable to dispose of in any other way.

I have deliberately not mentioned any names here, as people who have worked on this project have done so without expecting any reward – except of course for coffee and cake in our break time on work days! – but I do wish to thank and acknowledge each and every one of you for your unselfish support for this project. Some of the "labourers" involved have said that they are willing to continue to look after the churchyard as far as they can in the future. The 'old' churchyard is a closed area and as such the grass cutting is done by Eden District Council but there will be other work to do, perhaps three times a year.

There have been others who donated money to buy new trees, plus donations given to support the work that we have carried out. Although we did have a grant from the Yorkshire Dales Sustainable Development Fund we needed to provide a proportion of that ourselves, and with these cash donations and "time and skills" gifts we have been able to meet our obligations in this respect.

I hope you will all approve of the new look churchyard which I gather is now more like the "old" look churchyard (which older residents remember playing in as children), and that you will take the time to come up to All Saints and look at the board – kindly paid for by Orton Manor Court - in the porch and wander around to see the new trees and the garden and bulbs and other plants that will make their appearance as the warmer weather sets in.



Notes from the Herald, March, 1919

Stormy start then mixed till 19th, then very cold and snowy.

Orton The East Westmorland R.D.C. (in Kirkby Stephen) needs to build two new cottages in Gaisgill and Longdale; six in Newbiggin on Lune; eight or ten in Tebay – none in Orton itself.

Died at Front Street, on 23rd March, Alice Stubbs, 83, buried at Orton on 26th.

<u>Tebay</u> held a concert for the Tebay War Memorial Fund in the Market Hall on Friday, 28th February, the Vicar in Chair. Supper was included and a lot were there.

<u>Ravenstonedale</u> Newbiggin-on-Lune Primitive Methodists were given permission by their Circuit's quarterly meeting to raise funds for a new church and schoolroom. Ravenstonedale has been discussing what to get for its War Memorial. Ideas include a Monument, electric light, a District Nurse, a tennis court.

Late in March Newbiggin-on-Lune held its P.M. Chapel Christian Endeavour Concert in its Chapel. By 29th, Ravenstonedale had chosen its War Memorial. It's to be a District Nurse, funded by public subscription NOT by frivolities such as dances or whist drives.

Died at Elm Lodge, on the morning of Friday 7th, Mr. T.A. Metcalfe-Gibson, second son of the late Mr. Anthony Gibson, Park House. He was a stockbroker in the City but fell ill after seven years there and came North. His family includes the Yorkshire Melcalfes, the Bampton (Westmorland) Atkinsons and the Gibsons of Oddendale.





Quilting Exhibition at Hawes

Striking homemade quilts – which covered the beds of Dalesmen and women before the coming of the duvet – are to go on display at the Dales Countryside Museum in Hawes. A new collaborative exhibition with The Quilters' Guild of the British Isles, "Colour and Comfort", will run until 8th May.

It will showcase pieces from the collections of The Quilters' Guild and the Dales Countryside Museum.



Visitors will, for instance, be able to see an 1890 Swaledale farm guilt

saved from being used as a cover for a tractor; an unusual patchwork coverlet made in the mid-twentieth century by Norah Worth of Gayle; and a 120-year old black cotton quilted skirt worn by one Mary Metcalfe of Stalling Busk.

Museum Manager Fiona Rosher said: "The variety of patchwork and quilting styles in this exhibition shows the changing fashions in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

"Some pieces are purely decorative, made from



expensive materials and indicate the type of patchwork that would have been made in higher class households of the Yorkshire Dales. But many of the pieces on display are practical quilts and

demonstrate the need for a warm, comforting layer to soften the harsh conditions of rural, working life."

As part of the exhibition, a demonstration on quilting will be given by Kate Trusson between 1-4pm on Saturday 13^{th} April. Entry to the demonstration will be included in museum admission (£4.80 adults, children free, or £9 annual pass).

What is a quilt?

A quilt consists of three layers: a top layer that can be plain or pieced, a central layer for warmth, and a backing. These three layers are joined together by stitches, either decorative or simply even spaced knots, known as quilting.

References to quilts can be found in inventories and wills of the wealthier classes from the 13th century. They were treasured possessions in a household, often worth more than the bed itself.

In the 18th century there was a move away from the use of silks towards the new and fashionable cotton fabrics used for both dress and furnishings. By that time, quilting was being used for fashionable garments such as jackets, waistcoats, nightcaps and hats. The wearing of quilted petticoats may have been quite commonplace in winter in the Dales, perhaps long after the general fashion for wearing them in more urban areas had gone.
