### CHURCH LETTER

#### Dear Reader,

I wonder how this letter finds you. I wonder too how you are managing to survive in these dark days that we find ourselves in.

As we watch in dismay the continuing, heart-breaking news about the effects of Covid-19, the tensions in American politics that have exploded into public riots, the depressing statistics about the state of our environment and the gloomy weather forecasts that seem to keep us locked in the constant damp and darkness, it does make me wonder, how we will keep going?

And yet, there is much to be grateful for in the communities in which we live. For those people who care for us and help to keep us safe. For those helping with our shopping, or delivering our shopping, or even cooking and delivering our meals (you know who you are!). For those who are wrestling with the wonders of technology so that we can 'gather' even though we can't meet. For those sending a lot of love online through messages or music. For those dedicated to serving in the NHS to save precious lives. For those who are continuing to publish magazines, like this one, to help keep us connected.

And there are also signs of new life beginning to peep through the gloom, like the picture of a friend's early snowdrops, that little-bit-morelight at the end of each afternoon as the night's draw out again, the news of another family member who has received the vaccine, and the promise of Easter as the clock keeps turning and the earth continues its faithful rotations around the sun.

And this is the answer to the question that I find myself coming back to again and again. How do we keep going? *One day at a time.* 

And as I write that line I can feel a song coming on . . . . ! I'm just about old enough to remember the Lena Martell version that hit the charts in 1979 but some of you may know the

original by the country singer Marilyn Sellars in 1974?

It's perhaps not the 'spiritually enlightened' answer you'd expect from a church minister, but it's the one that resonates with me at the moment. Losing a loved one suddenly last autumn put the whole idea of time and days into sharp relief. I realised, very powerfully, that none of us know whether we have a tomorrow; all that we have is today, this gift of grace at the hand of God

The Bible reminds me that God provided manna for the Israelites 'one day at a time', and in the prayer Jesus taught us we ask, 'give us *this day* our daily bread'. We are encouraged neither to live in the past, nor to worry about the future, because doing either of these will mean we are missing the present, this gift of today.

This one day. Where we are right now.

And where we are is tough, and it may feel like a never-ending trial, but we are here together, as one community, and we are not on our own. And while we can't choose our circumstances, we can choose how we will respond to them.

#### A VIEW FROM TEBAY

As I write, a whole month has gone by since what must have been the strangest, and for many, the most difficult Christmas we can remember. Once again, we find ourselves in lockdown and our TV screens are filled with grim news of huge numbers of Covid deaths and our amazing healthcare staff stretched almost to breaking point.

Perhaps there are days when we feel overwhelmed by the bigness of it all and the seriousness of the situation we find ourselves in across the planet. Some of us are grieving those we have lost, whilst many are struggling with the loss of jobs, incomes, health, relationships and a sense of purpose and identity. How can we respond to such challenges?

Every year it amazes me that after the winter equinox and the shortest day on 21<sup>st</sup> December, the days seem to get even darker for a while especially as it seems to take so long for the daylight to filter into each morning. Where I was hoping for the sense of turning the corner, the darkness instead seems to get more intense and drags on for weeks. Days and nights of rain, gales, snow and fog add to the gloom, and hibernating inside actually feels like not such a bad idea after all.

And yet...there are moments of wonder. The blizzards give way to days of brilliant sunshine and I gasp at the stunning view of snowy fells rolling against deep blue skies, incredible ice formations in the grass and frozen spiders' webs. I stare into the fire in the evening, amazed at how such a fleeting thing as a flame can be so beautiful and bring such warmth. I watch the steam from my mug of coffee rising into the morning shafts of sunlight and remind myself how wonderful it is to be here – to be alive on this day, at this time, in this place.

There are moments of encouragement, too. A friend sends a card with comforting words through the post. I connect with a family member over Zoom and realise that even though we haven't met in person for ages, our relationship has deepened over this last year with all that has happened. A colleague expresses appreciation for my work. I stop in the midst of what I am doing and take a moment to be grateful – for this person, for this moment, for this act of kindness.

Maybe this time is teaching me – and perhaps all of us – that part of our response to the huge challenges of this time is simply to be grateful for each day that we are given, realising that life itself is an amazing gift, and we need to celebrate all the little moments of joy that God brings us every day, if we only take the time to notice them.

And from the frozen soil, snowdrops push their way through to reach for the winter sunshine, reminding us that spring is coming. Hope is around the corner. Death does not have the final word. God's love never fails.

And maybe I can respond to that love by playing my part in creating a cleaner, fairer, kinder world for everyone.

Now that would be a worthy response from each of us.

We were very glad to be able to distribute actual printed copies of the Christmas issue of **The Link**, by using the services of a Mailshot company. (They had promised to

They arranged delivery by post to all addresses in the 98 postcodes of the usual *Link* delivery area. This was very expensive, and could only be considered for that single issue; but we had money in the funds from saving on printing in 2020, and we felt that at Christmas it was worth it to communicate with all our parishioners, not just those with email access. So that is how you have got your copy!

At least, I hope you did! For some reason, some residents in Newbiggin and Ravenstonedale never received their posted copies - we were able to give some of them a copy from the "leftovers" batch. I do not know why there was this hiccup, or whose fault it was, and con only apologise to those who missed out.

But we heard many expressions of appreciation from readers that at last they had a printed copy of *The Link* to read - and in full colour throughout.

(We also sent it by email, for the sake of those who prefer to read it on screen. Yes, many people do!)

Sadly, with the worsening pandemic situation, we have had to revert to digital only for this month's issue, and we fear this is likely to continue for several months.

Some people have said we should just leave printed copies at some point in each village for people to pick up, if we don't want to ask our distributors to deliver it; but diocesan advice remains that this carries an infection risk, so - despite some indignant protests - we will follow that advice until it changes. (It would be impossible in the current lockdown anyway.)

We continue to solicit contributions of items of all kinds for inclusion, both written, photographic and artistic, and really appreciate those we have received!



We can all help to bring hope and encouragement to our neighbours in these difficult times.

### A Letter from our Archbishops

Dear friends

As we reach the terrible milestone of 100,000 deaths from COVID-19, we invite everyone in our nation to pause as we reflect on the enormity of this pandemic.

100,000 isn't just an abstract figure. Each number is a person: someone we loved and someone who loved us. We also believe that each of these people was known to God and cherished by God.

We write to you then in consolation, but also in encouragement, and ultimately in the hope of Jesus Christ. The God who comes to us in Jesus knew grief and suffering himself. On the cross, Jesus shares the weight of our sadness.

We therefore encourage everyone who is feeling scared, or lost or isolated to cast their fears on God. We also know that poorer communities, minority ethnic communities and those living with disabilities have been afflicted disproportionately and cry out for the healing of these inequalities. During this pandemic, we encourage everyone to do all they can to live within the guidelines and constraints given by government following the advice of the Chief Medical Officer and Chief Scientific Adviser. We show our commitment, care and love for one another by ensuring we do everything we can to stop the virus spreading.

None of this is easy. Very many of us are experiencing isolation, loneliness, anxiety and despondency like never before. Many people have lost their livelihoods. Our economy struggles. Also, the necessary restrictions we live with have also prevented us from being alongside loved ones as they died, or even at their graveside. All grief profoundly affects us, but this pandemic grief is so hard.

Therefore, we need to support each other. We do this by following the guidelines. But we also do it by reaching out to each other with care and kindness.

One thing we can all do is pray. We hope it is some consolation to know that the church prays for the life of our nation every day. Whether you're someone of faith, or not, we invite you to call on God in prayer. Starting on 1 February we invite you to set aside time every evening to pray, particularly at 6pm each day. More than ever, this is a time when we need to love each other. Prayer is an expression of love. 

Please be assured of our prayers. Please join us.



### Brandrith Stone: Information request

I am researching local boundary stones that were erected in former times to mark county boundaries and other limits. Early maps of the area around Tebay show а prominent large red stone (about 1.1m high) located between Old Tebay and Roundthwaite in the vicinity of Galloper Park. The stone also goes by the names: Bradrith or Brunsdreth. The stone was an important location for travellers navigating north and south.

Two crosses were incised on one side. Later maps show this stone to be incorporated within a drystone wall and used as a stile. Tradition states that in antiquity it was a boundary stone between England and Scotland, and latterly as a meeting place for cattle drovers to brand cattle.

The stone appears to have disappeared in the late 19<sup>th</sup> or 20<sup>th</sup> C, possible due to the construction of the M6 motorway, and would lie approximately where junction 38 services and roundabout are now. There is a rumour that it was removed to a local garden.

Any information (and photographs) as to the fate of the stone would be welcome.



### WESTMORLAND DALES APPRENTICES UPDATE

After a festive break, the Westmorland Dales Apprentices returned for the final two months of their apprenticeship.

First on the agenda was to teach them how to manage a hedge with the traditional countryside skill of hedgelaying.

Working with Tebay Parish Council, who had planted a hawthorn hedge at



Roundthwaite a decade ago; the team set about preparing the trees, chipping the removed material and laying the hedge. In the Spring the section we have laid will sprout and over time will become a thick hedgerow, providing shelter and habitat for wildlife.



Next winter a new team of apprentices will lay the remaining hedge as March will see these four voung people using their skills in new jobs. Before that, there are still jobs to complete, including erecting fence а at Gamelands Stone

Circle and waymarking a circular route over Crosby Fell.

It has been a great pleasure to equip Sarah, Rebekah, Abbi and Billy with skills for their futures and I look forward to repeating the challenge with four more budding conservationists later in the year.

#### COVID VACCINATIONS

We are delighted to say that we finished the first dose vaccinations for our patients who are over 80 or health and care workers on 21<sup>st</sup> January. Patients aged 75 to 79 are being vaccinated at the moment. Patients who are over 70 or in very high risk groups are being called for their first dose in early February. We are really keen to vaccinate everyone as quickly as possible. The number of vaccinations we can give has been limited by the amount of vaccine delivered so far. Most vaccine delivered so far has been the Pfizer vaccine which has difficult transport and storage needs. (It can only be moved 5 times from the factory in Europe and has to be stored at  $-70^{\circ}$ ) For this reason most people will be called to the central hub in Penrith to be vaccinated. We have small amounts of the Oxford vaccine which are being given to our housebound patients and those with severe allergies to medication so can't have the Pfizer vaccine. Sadly it is not possible at the moment to book a face to face doctor's appointment at Orton surgery. The doctors and nurses are continuing to operate a "telephone first" system at Shap Medical Practice. It is also possible to have a video consultation if you wish.

If a face to face consultation is needed, it will be arranged for you on the same day at Shap surgery. Some telephone and video appointments can be prebooked online, otherwise contact the surgery at 8.30am to arrange one. Surgery attendance for appointments will be kept to a minimum to reduce the risk of infection to our patients.


### Families ADVENTURING Together in Tebay & Orton

### What is Lent? When does Lent start? What to do during Lent?

Lent is the six week period

leading up to Easter. It's one of the most important times of year for many Christians around the world, particularly those within the Anglican, Catholic and Orthodox traditions.

Lent is a time of solemn observance and preparation for the celebration of the death and resurrection of Jesus at Easter. From its start on Ash Wednesday until its conclusion on Easter Sunday, Lent has been a traditional time for fasting or giving something up or abstinence. Just as we carefully prepare for events in our personal lives, as a wedding, or birthday, Lent invites us to make our minds and hearts ready for remembering Jesus' life, death and body resurrection.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, 46 days before Easter Sunday. Ash Wednesday is the day after Shrove Tuesday, which in the UK is more commonly known as Pancake Day.

Christians around the world observe Lent in many ways. Some will choose to give up just one item for Lent, more commonly a 'luxury' such as chocolate, meat or alcohol. It is also becoming increasingly common for people to give up other things in order to refocus their faith during this time; such as watching TV, going to the gym, even social media. Christians also use Lent to study their Bibles and pray more intensively, making use of the many devotional books and courses now available.

#### **Shrove Tuesday** (In 2021, 16<sup>th</sup> February)

"Shrove" comes originally from the word shrive (meaning "absolve").

As the last day before the Lent, Shrove Tuesday was a day of self-examination where Christians would consider what sins they needed to repent of and what changes to their life they would focus on during the fast.

Centuries ago, people would use Shrove Tuesday to remove from their house any of the items that they were foregoing for the 40 days of the Lent fast. Traditionally this included meat, fish, eggs, fats, milk and sugar – so Shrove Tuesday became the final blowout before Lent began!

These ingredients combine easily to make pancake batter, hence why in the UK Shrove Tuesday is now synonymous with the making, tossing and racing of pancakes. (See "Families Cooking Together", Page 13!)

### Ash Wednesday (In 2021, 17<sup>th</sup> February)

Ash Wednesday begins Lent. The day gets its name from the traditional blessing of the ashes taken after the burning of Palm branches (or crosses made from Palm leaves) from the previous year's Palm Sunday celebrations. In some churches the ashes are used to draw a cross on the forehead of people to mark the beginning of their Lent fast., often done while repeating the words "Repent and believe in the Gospel" (Mark 1:15) or "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19).

#### Lent Course in High Westmorland

During Lent we will be running a Lent Course online based on the Diocesan Course for this year provided by Bishop Emma.

There will be two options: **Tuesday evenings at 7.30pm** and **Thursdays at 2pm** starting on the 23<sup>rd</sup> & 25<sup>th</sup> February respectively, and running the five weeks during Lent. The Course will be offered throughout the Northern and Southern Mission Communities and led by the Clergy and Ministers of the Appleby area.

It will include Breakout Bible Study Groups as well as worship, fellowship and prayer.

The group sessions will follow up and link into sermons based on the Gospel readings of the previous Sunday.

We hope very much that you will find time to come and join us as part of your Lenten devotion.

Although no formal name has been ascribed to our Course I suggest that you can call it '**Ready to go'** based on Exodus chapter 12, as the Chosen People prepared for what became known as the Passover and left Egypt to head for the Promised Land.

In the same way we should be ready and prepared to go for Easter.

A Zoom invitation link will be emailed out nearer the time.












#### **Trees for Eddie**

I've always had a deep love of trees, most likely from on my early days in Ashton-under-Lyne, Lancashire. There were few trees in the town apart from around some of the churches, and the War Memorial. One special place was Stamford Park, which was rich in mature trees, and a joy to explore. Therefore it has been with a sense of pure delight and satisfaction that I had 200 trees planted on a piece of fallow land at Mill House, a couple of months ago.



This would not have been possible except for the help from Alison and Steve Dobson, who have already planted a number of trees on their land. They made the arrangements for me, and with advice from the Woodland Trust, helped me to purchase the trees. They are made up of oak: rowan: lime: hazel: silver birch: wild cherry: bird cherry and crab apple, and they came with wooden stakes and protective green tubing.

The day after their arrival in late November, Alison and Steve worked for three days to plant all the trees. So I now have a 'baby' woodland to send into the future. Eddie, my late husband, would have been thrilled to see the new planting, as he was always very attuned to nature. He had a saying which he often repeated: 'The land is faithful'. It would not have been possible in the past, as this part of the field was used for night grazing for our dairy herd.



At the moment a great deal of imagination is required as I peep down the green tubes, to see just a tiny twig sitting at the bottom – but I know they will grow, bringing new life and eventually a new habitat to the field.

### THE STORY OF GOOD KING WENCESLAS, THE POOR MAN, WENCE AND LASSIE

Many years ago, Good King Wenceslas decided to give the poor inhabitants of his village of Porton some lasting gifts. He gave them a church (St. Wenceslas); a village hall (Wenceslas Hall) and a statue of himself for the market square. After his death the church fell into disrepair and the poor villagers did not know how to find the money to do it up. The village hall was condemned by the Health and Safety people as having no loos, no fire exits and no disabled access. His statue had become covered in graffiti, far too rude to mention here.

The Poor Man also wanted to leave gifts for his friend (Wence) and his daughter (Lassie), but he was stony broke. However, he noticed that Wence was doing a grand job on repairs to the church and he suggested that Wence apply to the Pumbrian National Park Authority for an apprenticeship to be a carpenter. Wence was not sure he would qualify, but the Poor Man gave him a good reference and Wence got the job. He later went on to be a master carpenter and established a thriving business, giving employment to the people of Porton for many years.

The Poor Man noticed that Lassie was a talented Sunday School teacher (classes held in bus shelter due to leaking church roof). He encouraged Lassie to apply for a grant to train to be a teacher and she went on to teach the children of Porton and surrounding villages for decades. She was greatly respected and loved by all who knew her. Her pupils volunteered to clean the graffiti off the statue of Good King Wenceslas.



#### **Picturing the Westmorland Dales**

This autumn children in the Westmorland Dales have been exploring the landscape through land art. We are working with Community arts 'We are Team', land artists 'Stomping Ground' and 6 local primary schools using Land Art creations to celebrate local landmarks and nature. This lovely project has helped connect children with the natural world encouraging them to look closely at materials such as sticks, pine cones, stones, soils, leaves, grass and wool.

They have created collages used natural materials, using them like a paint brush, creating beautiful art pieces. During these sessions children began first by creating individual art pieces which helped to develop their skills and fire the imagination leading to the final group piece. The children chose an image, made a frame and built the image up in layers, like a sketch before fine tuning the outlines of the final piece.



Some of the images created by Primary schools include Hardendale Cairn and Smardale Viaduct, Nine standards, a red squirrel, a short-eared owl, Orton Scar monument and a Tebay fell pony. Jon Chappell from M60TV filmed and photographed the sessions which showcases their work and bring the schools together in this unifying joyous project. It highlights the children's connection to their villages and creates a sense of place and a sense of hope for the future.

Many thanks to the children and teachers at our fantastic local Primary Schools who enabled this to happen. Orton C of E School, Crosby Ravensworth C of E School, Asby Endowed School, Tebay Primary, Shap CE Primary and Kirkby Stephen Primary School.

They work so hard to maintain a sense of normality whilst keeping children safe during these difficult times.



#### Lady Anne Clifford



September 2020 bronze а statue of Lady Anne Clifford was installed outside the Tourist Information Centre in Kirkby Stephen in Cumbria. Born in 1590, Lady Anne was the daughter of the Earl of Cumberland and, as a woman, had to fight to claim her natural inheritance. marriages Two made her Countess of Dorset and of Pembroke. but when she was widowed a second time she returned to spend her old age in Westmorland.

The 2m high statue was made by Diane Lawrenson, sculptor and member of Appleby-in-Westmorland Arts Society. Diane said: "The sculpture captures the spirit of the indomitable Lady Anne Clifford with her steely determination, walking through old Westmorland."

Lady Anne, who lived from 1590 to 1676, was a formidable lady who often walked the 100 miles between her five ancestral castles in Westmorland and Cumberland. After her many years' absence her castles and other properties were in a ruinous state so she set about rebuilding, visiting and caring for her tenants. There is now a long-distance walk called *Lady Anne's Way*, which visits the five castles, starting at Skipton in North Yorkshire, and goes north by Pendragon, Brough, and Appleby, finishing at Brougham near Penrith.

Diane's earlier prize-winning group, the Bronte Sisters of Haworth, was set on the Yorkshire moors that Diane knows so well. Diane has received several awards for her work, including London Art UK Special Sculpture Awards, at the Society of Women Artists exhibitions in the Mall Galleries in London.

#### Rangers repair Ravenstonedale footbridge

A short, popular walk in the Westmorland Dales can be enjoyed once again after a footbridge close to Scandal Beck was put back into place.

Flood waters ripped the footbridge from its abutments earlier this year and left the structure against a field wall.

The footbridge was a key part of a circular walk



out of Ravenstonedale village to Bowber Head and back by Low Lane or via Ash Fell.


The ranger service obtained consent from Cumbria County Council for works on 'ordinary watercourses', carrying out an ecological impact assessment. A local contractor then built mortared stone walls either side of the stream and laid concrete pads, before the wooden bridge was repaired and lifted into place.

The work was funded through the 'Discovering the Westmorland Dales' project, part of the <u>Westmorland</u> <u>Dales Landscape Partnership scheme</u> supported by the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

Member Champion for Recreation Management at the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority, Nick Cotton, said: ""In the west area of the National Park, reaching from Kirkby Lonsdale in the south to Sedbergh and beyond to the Westmorland Dales, there are 339 footbridges. This one crossed a tributary only a few metres away from Scandal Beck, just upstream from Ravenstonedale village. As is typical in the Dales, innocent little streams can become pretty vicious after heavy rainfall and the footbridge couldn't withstand the force of the water. Rangers have put back the bridge slightly higher than before and carried out some landscaping. I'm glad to see it looking well again. Ravenstonedale is a beautiful part of the world and a quiet place to see wildlife such as red squirrels and kestrels."

#### Building works complete at Community and Heritage Centre in Ravenstonedale

Works to extend the Community and Heritage Centre in Ravenstonedale were completed just before Christmas, providing new toilet facilities and disabled access as well as storage and office space.



This ambitious project was first discussed in 2006 when the Parish Council purchased the old URC Chapel and set about turning it into a community space available for hire.

The recent extension was made possible thanks to generous grants from Eden District Council's Signature

Projects Fund and Yorkshire Dales National Park's

Sustainable Development Fund as well as donations from local residents.

The Community and Heritage Centre is now available for to hire events, functions. meetings and other activities. The centre boasts a large main hall, two meeting rooms,



kitchen areas, toilet facilities and disabled access. It also hosts a substantial historical local archive which is maintained by the Ravenstonedale History Group.

It is hoped that many groups will be able to make use of the facility once we are free from the current pandemic.



### RAVENSTONEDALE PARISH HISTORY GROUP

#### Lockdown 2 inspires Ravenstonedale to Zoom in on a pub's history

The Herald recently reported the achievement of Ravenstonedale Parish History Group (RPHG), in organising a live meeting in October, working with Newbiggin-on-Lune Public Hall, to implement social distancing rules and procedures to enable an event to be presented. Despite the enthusiastic response from members, Lockdown 2 meant the live November meeting could not proceed as planned.

In an attempt to respond positively to the new circumstances and recognising the continuing interest in Ravenstonedale Parish for local history events, RPHG followed in the footsteps of many other groups and signed up to Zoom. Val Fermer edited a talk from 2018 and presented for 25 minutes on the history of The Black Swan in Ravenstonedale. Such was the interest that around 40 people attended the on-line talk, a much larger audience than the live events typically attract. In addition to regular members and others who enjoy the live events, the Zoom invitation could be extended to the more remote members and those new to RPHG, with an interest in the subject. Consequently there were many participants from further afield than the Parish, including Wales and Kent, who entered the Zoom meeting.

In the truncated 25 minute talk (considered the most suitable duration for an on-line lecture) Val reported on 247 years of the Black Swan history, including a 1769 document in the possession of RPHG that suggests the pub was one of the first in the Northern Hemisphere to be named The Black Swan. Extensive research was presented, regaling the audience with the identity of Landlords and owners from the 1700's right up to the present day. It was only the period between 1940 and 1952 that Val was unable to confirm the identity of the Landlord, however for the entire 247 year period (1773 –

2020), the identity of the owner was traced.

In many cases anecdotes gathered from oral histories added further depth to the chronological account of owners and Landlords. These included Laurie Hemms (1980's), a competitor in the TV programme 'it's a knockout' ,Tim Hartley (1960's), owner of a locally admired, occasionally wrecked, Jaguar sports car, Stan Smith who was famous for also driving a taxi in which the passenger could expect to be sharing the ride with a calf (1950's) and Joshua Brunskill who in 1864 held a trotting race against the Kings Head Ravenstonedale, which he lost to the local rival, all the way back to 1773 when Isaac Teasdale was recorded as the Innkeeper.




Architect's design for the new 1899 building for John Carver

There were famous and infamous historical guests (it is believed the pub has been an Hotel throughout its existence), including Hinge and Brackett, popular TV stars from the 70's and 80's. Sergeant Thompson was a short lived guest, who hanged himself in 1821 in the pub (and possibly remains as a guest, if rumours of haunting are true). A multi-millionaire Victorian investor in the Village, John Carver of Manchester, rebuilt the hotel in the late 1800's. The rebuilding was part of a project to develop Ravenstonedale as a spa resort. Photographs, many of which can be seen today in the bar of the Black Swan, record the pub before and after its rebuilding.

As Ravenstonedale is fortunate to have three popular pubs in the parish, two further Zoom events are planned, to be dedicated to the Kings Head and the Fat Lamb respectively. Details of all events are available on the RPHG website. Zoom events are free and open to members, visitors and new participants.

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
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

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
