## CHURCH LETTER

It came out of the blue, a complete surprise — an act of kindness and generosity that I wasn't at all expecting, that I don't think I deserved, and which I found deeply moving. No need to go into more detail. The person responsible might well read this and I don't want to cause embarrassment!

But it made me think — especially after an Easter that was the strangest in my experience, with little real way to celebrate and no way of preparing for it except as best we could individually. But it didn't come as a surprise to any of us: for Christians it marks the end of 6½ weeks of Lent and for all of us it's the first public holiday weekend of the year. So it's something we look forward to eagerly, even if this year Covid made it a bit of a damp squib.

It was very different for the first friends of Jesus. For them, the good news of Easter came as a complete surprise. They had thought that their adventure with Jesus of Nazareth, with all its hope and possibility, had ended in defeat and disgrace. The evil that men do had overcome goodness. It was all over.

But it wasn't. And whatever sense we may make of the first Easter story, one thing is clear. It is the story of good overcoming evil, and the promise that in the end, that's how it is.

So I am grateful for that small surprise gift of kindness that was given to me. It was like a mini-Easter: something to pass on — a hint that goodness, kindness and generosity can still prevail in our world, even at a time when hope has sometimes been hard to find, because in the end evil doesn't have

the last word.

And the ripple effect of the first Easter changed the world. Is it too much to hope that the ripple effect of this Easter, among us, may begin to do the same?

## A VIEW FROM TEBAY

Some of our readers will have heard of Families Together in Tebay and Orton – we're a group of folk, many of us linked to the local churches, who want to see more good stuff happening for individuals – children and adults – and families. One of our recent projects, over Easter, was to create a "Tree of Lost Things" in Orton and Tebay villages, where people could come and tie on ribbons to remember those people and things that had been lost during the last, difficult, twelve months.

Below the 'tree' of lost things was a planter, that people were encouraged to plant seeds into. Our hope is that some of those seeds will grow, and that we will see new life springing up, even as we remember those we have lost. If you pass Tebay Methodist chapel you might see the planter outside – look closer and see whether you can see any of those seeds starting to poke through the soil...

New life is springing up all around us now, with lambs getting bigger and stronger in the fields, grass coming through, and plants and trees showing new growth too. That new life carries with it the encouragement of hope: hoping for new things, for better times, hoping that we continue to come out of lockdown, hoping to meet people face-to-face again without masks, and without having to keep our distance.

As we mourn the loss of our beloved Rev Ian Elliott, so often involved at St James' and in and around the villages and their churches, or enjoying a sports game on the big screen in the club, that hope of new life has encouraged us despite our grief. A friend reminded us of words from the book of Corinthians, in the Bible, that "what is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable... it is sown a natural body, it is raised a spiritual body". For those of us who believe, we have that amazing promise, that death is not the end, that new (and better) life will spring up and that all the imperfections of our human selves will be made perfect and eternal! It sounds unbelievable, doesn't it, but that's the truth that we find at the heart of the Easter story, that started with loss, and being tied to a tree.

So, can I both challenge and encourage you? When you see one of our planters in the village, with new life springing up; or when you stop to watch a lamb playing in the sun; or catch the sound of children playing, or young people enjoying life; why not stop, just for a moment, and give thanks – that despite the losses that we have all shared in different ways, that new life, and new hope, is possible?

Our housebound patients who were vaccinated on 21st January will be given their second vaccines on 7th and 8th April. You will be contacted prior to this date.



### A reflection on the Shap Easter Garden 2021



As I created the Easter garden in time for Palm Sunday I used a lot of green moss and tucked little pots of violas and primulas in amongst it. I was aware that I was

observed closely by my regular garden birds.

On Palm Sunday morning in torrential rain I strewed yew and a palm cross on the garden and attached cards about Palm Sunday to the railings. I thought about the weather on the first Palm Sunday - the sto-



ry gives a feeling of joy and celebrations - so I think it would be sunny.

I keep watching out of the window as the birds explore the garden - first, a blackbird who digs out several violas, in search of grubs - I replant them.

A wren tugs long strands of moss and flies off to build one if his des-res nests which he will take his intended to view so that she can make her choice. He flits about and sings loudly - the wren symbolizes action, accuracy, watchfulness and enthusiasm in life.

The sparrows are also collecting nest material from the Easter Garden - and I have just spotted that a nest is being constructed above the front door - evidenced by

bits of moss and twigs on the doorstep - who the builder is I have yet to discover.

On Maundy Thursday morning I put new signs up and place bread and a cup in the garden - the bread soon disappears! I had anticipated that and placed

a sign showing the elements too. In the evening I go to the garden again and feel a chill in the air - it would have been cold in Gethsemane as Jesus prayed and the disciples slept.

At daybreak on Good Friday I open the door to see hoar frost and there is a sharp nip in the air. The village is quiet with no-one astir. As I set the crosses in place and place a crown of thorns on the central one I see a robin hopping around watching me - I shouldn't be surprised at the presence of this little bird, for legend tells us that

when Jesus was on the road to Calvary, a robin plucked

a thorn from Christ's temple and a drop of Jesus' blood fell on the robin's chest, turning it red.

As the sun warms the ground I notice that the green hill with the crosses on top in the garden is steaming - gently drifting vapour rather like incense.

Later I go with my grandsons Finn and Tom to walk the route normally taken for the Good Friday walk,



down to Shap Abbey, where we read the story of the crucifixion and make crosses from strips of paper I have



taken with me. We then walk across the fields to Keld - the Chapel is closed, so we head back home; a beautiful sunny spring day with sheep and lambs in the fields, birds

flitting around and trees coming into leaf - new life everywhere. Yet this is a day when I feel it ought to be rainy and stormy - as it has been for some walks in the past - the sky weeping for the sacrifice and adding a sombre atmosphere.

Just before sunset I go and remove the moss that has been concealing the great stone sealing the tomb and place more signs for Easter Eve.

Another frosty morning, these moments of quiet in the early morning give opportunity to reflect on the events of long ago in a far-off land. The hill steams yet again. At sunset I place a candle outside the tomb.

Morning has broken on Easter Day and a heavy

dew lies over the garden. I visit the tomb to make the final changes the stone is rolled away and the linen cloth laid inside. New signs proclaim 'He is Risen!'. The sun lights the open tomb and the birds sing in celebration.

In the stillness of the new day I give thanks for God's gift of his Son, and rejoice in his resurrection.



I pray that everyone may have a blessed Easter, and for those who are ill or bereaved that they may be surrounded by the comforting presence of our Risen Lord.

It has been a privilege to share the Easter story with passers-by through the Easter Garden.

## **Scoop That Poop!**

Recently I was walking along an unfamiliar footpath parallel to the road in Tebay, between the Barnaby Rudge and St James' churchyard; and I noticed a number of signs obviously home-made - asking people to pick up dog mess and "bag it and bin it". (I can't remember the precise words.) Not only that - there were plastic drink bottles strapped to fence posts, with poo bags in them, and a little window cut in the bottle for people to help themselves to a bag, if they had forgotten to bring one (or accidentally dropped it from their pocket when using a phone or handkerchief).

There were also several charming little posters obviously designed and drawn by children.

What struck me was that this was obviously a community effort, and was plainly effective - I saw no dog mess anywhere along that path.

By contrast some signs have recently appeared around Orton, some of which say things like "Leaving your dog poo behind is disgusting" or "This community says **NO** to lazy dog owners." They were apparently put up by Eden Community Wardens who describe the wording to me as "hard-hitting". Personally they struck me as rude and aggressive, and giving an angry and unwelcoming message to visitors to our village. (Others of their posters were more courteous.)

I too very much dislike finding dog mess on the road or verges, and deplore the thoughtlessness of people who leave it there. I have been a dog owner myself and never found it a problem to take bags with me to clear up after my pet.

The question is - what are the best tactics to encourage thoughtless people to change their ways? I would have thought that rude and aggressive language would be counter-productive and just get their backs up! But a gentle, community-based request, such as those in Tebay, is more likely to nudge offenders to be more thoughtful.

What do you think? A friendly ask, or an angry scold?

This is a great opportunity for people with an appreciation of the landscape, a love of the outdoors and a strong interest in conservation to step into the land based sector. As shown by the jobs that Abbi, Billy, Rebekah and Sarah went on to do, these



apprenticeships equip young people with the skills needed for their future careers.

The Skills for the Future scheme teaches apprentices

practical skills such as drystone walling and hedge laying; path maintenance and gate making. It allows them to get involved in community projects such as tree planting and partnership projects like natural flood management and heritage surveys. Over the



18 months, apprentices gain wildlife ID skills, knowledge of countryside matters, a whole raft of practical qualifications and a Level 2 Countryside Standard.

Our Westmorland Dales Landscape Conference took place online on Saturday 27<sup>th</sup> March 2021. John Dunning, the chair of the partnership, set the scene before a

wonderful cross-section of presentations from our partner organisations and project leads loosely focussed around our natural, cultural and connecting heritage themes.

Keith Cooper, a Great Asby historian gave us an excellent insight in the development of its medieval village-scape through the innovative use of satellite images. Other presentations covered upland farming, geology, natural flood management, wildflower meadows, archaeological and built heritage surveys, routes through the area and the apprentices. We had time for two question and answer sessions and the conference was rounded off with our "Picturing the Westmorland Dales" film featuring the landscape artwork produced by the local primary schools.

The conference and series of webinars have been a great success, broadening our reach and including people who might not have attended otherwise because they live too far away, don't have their own transport or are of limited mobility. And we've found that even more people have enjoyed our recordings, so do watch this one and feel free to share the link with your friends.

We are of course keen to get outside for real again so watch this space for events, walks and other activities as lockdown restrictions ease. A huge thank you to everyone who contributed to the conference and to the National Lottery Heritage Fund whose support has been crucial.

## **Bretherdale & Joseph O' the Knott**

The inclusion in the April Link of the dialect poem written by Joseph W. Thwaites of Parrocks, Bretherdale, prompted me to write. The origin of the dale's name sometimes is believed to be a reference to briars or, as in the poem, to two or three brothers who farmed the valley in recent history. The more likely origin is the fact that, from the 12C, the valley was owned by the monks (brethren) of Byland Abbey, with brothers based at Roundthwaite priory, until the dissolution of the monasteries by Henry VIII. In the last century, a rare engraved lead weight (c. 7lb), used by the abbey to weigh wool, was found in Bretherdale and is now in the Science Museum.

Parrocks is now a sad ruin, as is Knott House on the far side of Breast High. At the end of the 18<sup>th</sup> C Joseph Robinson, who lived at Knott House, was better known as "Joseph o' the Knott" or "Jossy with the whips". He was well known in the district, being eccentric but affable; he decorated himself with peacock feathers and foxes tails, always carrying two or three whips, and wearing on his fingers a number of rings. A strong man, he was honest and inoffensive in his dealings; occasionally he had with him a few books for sale. Joseph would say "come will ta buy a buke: it will fill three twenty good stories or mebbie forty less".

Jossy was laid to rest around 1812 in Orton Church yard. After the requiem for this colourful person, the Rev. George Bowness, residing at Orton Townhead, wrote a poem to Joseph's memory. Rev. Bowness was a clergyman of literary acquirements, being for some time head master of the grammar school of Witton-le-Wear, Durham. He translated into modern English the market charter granted to Orton by Oliver Cromwell. Living to a good age, Bowness died at his residence in Orton about 1844. I have a copy of the poem if anyone is interested in the detail.

Tantrums and
Tiaras
Behind the scenes
at the Royal
Opera House

Nigel Bates described himself as 'Head of Drums' in the Royal Opera House Orchestra at the April Zoom lecture for the Appleby Arts Society last Wednesday.



His talk covered far more than

tantrums and tiaras as he described the day-to-day workings of its 1200 full-time employees, whether musicians rehearsing the next opera or ballet, stage hands manipulating enormous sets on wheels, or principal artists performing in one of the eight rehearsal areas.

The Ballet is a company which includes all the Principals whereas in Opera the soloists come from all over the world sometimes for a single performance. Nigel said the pressure on Opera singers was intense - each one is only as good as the last performance. For instance Bryn Terfel, singing Scarpia in Tosca at the ROH recently had to make an entrance rising to the stage through an understage trapdoor, needing instantly to be in character, in time and on pitch with the orchestra which he did every night to perfection. We then saw a clip from Milan Opera House of a tenor singing in Aida who was booed off by the audience and never returned.

We heard how empathetic an orchestra can be with great performers. Angela Georgiou was playing Mimi in La Boheme and in the final death scene her performance was so heart rending the orchestra played their quietest ever.

Stage staff have their ways of letting a performer know that offhand treatment will not be tolerated. At the end of the opera Tosca, Tosca herself throws herself off the castle walls. In reality she falls onto a crash mat behind the stage. This was replaced by a trampoline once at the dress rehearsal by a disgruntled stage crew for a performer they disapproved of she behaved herself ever after.

We saw an extract from the end of the Ring where the stage is ablaze at the front and the waters of the Rhine are rising at the back. Scary stuff for all staff as historically the Opera House has burnt down twice before.

Finally, in the ballet Two Pigeons, Sir Frederic Ashton wanted live birds, suitably trained. At one performance one flew off the shoulder of the dancer and into the auditorium, perching on a light fitting high up. A replacement bird arrived and behaved itself on stage, but at the climax of the ballet when the two pigeons were perched on the back of a chair as per opera, the auditorium bird flew down to join them, so it was Three Pigeons that night!

The next meeting is **Brett Whiteley's Lavender Bay** given by Paul Chapman, Art Historian, on May  $12^{\rm th}$ .

## Families Planting Together

18 families took part in our Easter Egg Trails in Orton or Tebay churchyards on Holy Saturday—the day before Easter Day. Most of them, after completing the trail and collecting their prize chocolate eggs, then agreed to take home some of the summer flowering bulb kits—each one with a flowerpot, a bag of compost (peat-free, of course!), a bulb (or several, depending on size!), and instructions for care.

They will plant their bulbs in the pots, water them, and keep them safe and warm—frost-free in this chilly weather!.

After a few weeks they should begin to sprout above the soil—an exciting glimpse of new life!



Sometime around the end of May, when we will hopefully be safe from frosts, we will get in touch with the bulb-carers, and arrange to meet so that the new plants can be transplanted into one of the new wooden troughs beautifully made by Adrian Allen of Tebay. There will be five troughs in Orton and five in Tebay, set up in suitably prominent spots around each village, to give pleasure to us all as they

start to flower.

Each trough will then be the responsibility of a nearby resident, who have promised to keep them watered in dry weather, and free of weeds.

We are very grateful to Orton and Tebay Parish Councils who have contributed £200 each, which almost exactly covers the cost of the bulbs and materials, and the troughs.

1<sup>st</sup> April: My wife and I were both immunised yesterday!

2<sup>nd</sup> April: Dear friends, this needs urgent prayer. Two months ago the son of one of our Christian widows, a boy of 19 years, burnt himself with hot water. The mother kept quiet till now. Treatment bills were 2,1`73,400 shillings. 500,000 has been paid so there remains



a balance of 1,673,400 shillings (About £360.) We are praying to God that good Samaritans come to assist and we pay off the debt. Could you please join us in our prayers.

7<sup>th</sup> April: Greetings for Easter weekend. Let me hope it was somehow good in spite of a number of deaths of our friends.

Reply, 8<sup>th</sup> April: We had a good Easter. We would like to help with the medical costs of your widow's son. We have sent 1,695,496 UGX by Western Union... 6 of us contributed to this gift. I hope the young man is recovering.

From Nelson: Thanks so much for the help. We are relieved. I will continue praying with those 6 of you to prosper in their faith and wealth. I appreciate your generous giving.

(Rev. Nelson has been praying with his church for a person in Orton who was ill with Covid, when told about the need. He has continued to enquire after this person's progress.)







### RAVENSTONEDALE PARISH HISTORY GROUP

## Politics, Persecution and Prison A historical perspective of the early Quakers in Westmorland

Zoom continues to be popular as an alternative to live talks, for the Ravenstonedale Parish History Group. An audience of around fifty attendees 'zoomed in' on the 30th March, to watch Les Neal present on the history of the Quakers in Westmorland and the reasons for the persecution of the early Quakers. Les explored the political reasons for the early persecution of Quakers and the instruments of law that were employed.

The Zoom talk was an introduction to a more extensive talk, planned for when live events are allowed, in which Les will talk about the early history of a number of Quaker families from Ravenstonedale parish and its surrounds.

Les began his talk with an historical overview, commencing at the start of the  $17^{th}$  Century, when numerous 'dissenting' religious groups had arisen, united in their wish to reform the practice of the existing order of religion. Nineteen of these groups were listed by Les, including the Muggletonians and the Barrowists. The early years of the first English Civil War (1642 - 1646), saw the emergence from these groups of those seeking radical reform. The radical reformers were described as the 'independents'.

The second civil war (1648 - 1649) coincided with the passing of a number of laws that, whilst not specifically aimed at the Quakers led to their persecution with many fines and imprisonment. In 1652 Westmorland becomes a focus in the early days of the Quaker movement, with the arrival of George Fox in Sedbergh, and his open air preaching at what is now called 'Fox's Pulpit' on Firbank Fell. After a period of increasing enforcement of control of the Quaker movement, the restoration of the Monarchy in 1660 promised some tolerance.

In Charles 1<sup>st</sup> Declaration of Breda, he states,

'we do declare liberty to tender consciences: and that no man shall be disquieted, or called into question, for differences of opinion in matters of religion which do not disturb the peace of the Kingdom'

Tolerance was short-lived, following events inspired by opposition to the Monarchy and fresh legislation was introduced, designed to enforce conformity to the then required form of worship (Congregationalist). The new laws were collectively described as the Clarendon Code.

In Westmorland, Sir Philipp Musgrave and others enthusiastically enforced the Clarendon Code. Les illustrated his talk with examples of persecution and original publications documenting legal proceedings taken against Quakers in Westmorland. The examples included an account of the life imprisonment of Frances Howgill in 1663 (who died in prison in 1669). The Vicar of Kirkby Stephen was an opponent of the rapidly growing

Quaker movement and was instrumental in the arrest of the Quaker missionaries James Naylor and Frances Howgill

It was not until 1687, with the accession to the throne of James II, that tolerance for Quakers began to be enacted with a series of laws including the Toleration Act of 1689 and much later the Sacramental Test Act of 1829. This last act brought freedom to the Quaker movement and by 1833, Quakers were no longer prohibited to hold offices under the Crown.

In his following talk, Les will present on how these historical events were experienced in the lives of Quaker families in Ravenstonedale Parish. Ravenstonedale Parish History Group (RPHG) is looking forward to this future 'live' event. Before this, Les will also present a 'live' lecture on the history of Caldbeck (in Ravenstonedale Parish).
